# CLASSROOM EXPERIENCES (ENGLISH LANGUAGE)

We are dedicated to developing confident, creative, effective and empathetic communicators. Students engage with the language through diverse and dynamic activities such as Hot Seating, debates, and hands-on activities. Events like Language & Literacy @ HGS provide our students with opportunities to explore and celebrate language in creative ways.

Students also showcase their language skills to authentic audiences through Read @ HGS, Structured Airtime, and the P2 Speech and Drama Showcase. These platforms allow students to build confidence, apply their learning, and showcase their skills to peers and the wider school community. Through these varied experiences, students not only develop their language skills but foster a love for the English Language that goes beyond the classroom.









## CLASSROOM EXPERIENCES (MATHEMATICS)

At HGS, we believe that learning Mathematics should extend beyond the classroom and be meaningful in students' daily lives. To make Mathematics engaging and relevant for our Primary 2 students, we provide opportunities for hands-on learning that bring mathematical concepts to life.

For example, for the topic on Mass, students learned how to read a kitchen scale in grams. They then applied this knowledge by measuring the mass of ingredients to bake chocolate chip cookies. Through this activity, students not only practised accuracy but also demonstrated the school value of cooperation by working in groups, with each member contributing to the process.

The students thoroughly enjoyed the experience, especially when they got to taste the cookies they made! They felt a great sense of accomplishment when the cookies turned out delicious, and their efforts were rewarded. Parents were pleased and gave positive feedback, appreciating how Mathematics lessons at HGS are both meaningful and memorable.







## CLASSROOM EXPERIENCES (SCIENCE)



During Science lessons, hands-on learning provides students with rich, authentic experiences by letting them make hypotheses, predictions and observations. This active engagement promotes critical thinking, reinforces scientific concepts, and makes learning more memorable by connecting abstract ideas to tangible experiences.

For example, during P6 Science lessons, students tested for the presence of starch in food using iodine. Students were encouraged to bring their own food items, which made the experiment feel more personal and engaging. Before commencing their investigations, students first hypothesised which food items would react to iodine, adding an element of curiosity and excitement. Watching the colour change made it clear which foods had starch and helped them understand the role of starch in their diet as a source of energy. Group discussions of their results allowed them to build on one another's ideas.



## CLASSROOM EXPERIENCES (MOTHER TONGUE)

#### Enhancing Chinese Oral Skills through ICT Integration (Primary 6)

To enhance upper primary students' Chinese oral skills, we integrate technology tools like ClassPoint and SLS into our lessons.

Through ClassPoint, students participate in topic-based discussions, share key points and vocabulary, and collaborate on learning tasks. These activities develop critical and inventive thinking, fostering creative and analytical responses, while strengthening communication and collaborative skills through sharing of ideas.

Key discussion points are incorporated into SLS oral assignments, enabling students to produce richer and higher-quality recordings.

This interactive approach boosts class engagement, enhances learning, and equips students to deliver more thoughtful responses, while cultivating essential 21st-century competencies such as critical thinking and digital literacy.



#### **Unpacking Stories**

#### Using ICT Tools for Malay 5W1H Comprehension and Sentence Building (Primary 1)

In this lesson, students read a big book together as a class. Using the 5W1H framework (Who, What, Where, When, Why, How), students analysed the story's characters and plot. They then attempted Kahoot quizzes to test their understanding of the text. They also used the 5W1H framework and their understanding of



characters' feelings to express their opinions about the story. After learning the correct sentence structures, students engaged in 'Wordwall' activities, where they rearranged jumbled up words into grammatically-correct sentences, reinforcing their understanding of sentence components and structures

This interactive approach fosters active learning, creativity and problem-solving which will enable them to think critically and express their ideas clearly.

#### Mother Tongue Camp - Pongal Festival

Every year, the HGS Mother Tongue Department organises a Mother Tongue Camp for our students. This annual event aims to help students learn, understand and appreciate Singapore's cultural diversity.

This year, the Hindu Harvest Festival known as 'Pongal' was the theme of the camp organised by the Tamil department. The objective was to help students understand the significance of agriculture and learn about how *padi* is harvested around the world.

Five stations were set up in the school hall, each hosting one activity. At the first station, students learnt a traditional group dance known as 'Kollattam'. Each performer holds a pair of sticks called 'Kol', hence the name 'Kollattham'. They dance either in rows or a circle, hitting one another's Kols as they go along. It is a popular folk dance performed during 'Pongal' festival. At the second station, students learnt how to make 'Pongal' greeting cards. 'Rangoli' art was taught at the third station, where students used coloured rice to create intricate and beautiful floor designs. At the fourth station, students exercised their creativity by painting mini lamps with the colours of their choices. The fifth station, which was the final station, was the highlight of the event. Students played a traditional game with the objective of hitting a stack of blocks with a ball.

All the students enjoyed the activities while learning more about the different cultures in Singapore.



### **CLASSROOM EXPERIENCES (ART)**

Our Art programme offers diverse creative experiences, including mixed media, batik painting, digital painting, animation, fashion illustration as well as design and fabric art. Signature programmes such as the Drawing Modules, ICT Art programmes and the museum-based art initiative - Think! Contemporary, foster artistic exploration, skill development, and innovative thinking.

This year's highlight includes the P3 Ceramic Art Programme which offers students a unique hands-on experience in creating ceramic sculptures inspired by the theme Natural World, Save Our Earth. Through this programme, students explored and expressed their love for nature while building awareness of environmental conservation. Inspired by local artist Han Sai Por's artwork entitled Black Forest and guided by the theme, they crafted ceramic artworks that represent diverse flora and fauna found on our planet.

The programme not only enhances artistic skills but also promotes creativity, patience, and an appreciation for nature. As students proudly admired their completed, glazed artwork, they embraced their roles as young ambassadors for a more sustainable Earth.











### **CLASSROOM EXPERIENCES (MUSIC)**



At HGS, our music programme is a dynamic, holistic initiative that nurtures creativity, cultural appreciation, and character growth through experiential, ensemble-based, and collaborative learning in authentic contexts. At lower primary, students build musical foundations through interactive singing games, movement, and creative music-making. Middle to upper primary students deepen their cultural awareness by improvising folk tunes on the Gamelan and exploring vocal jazz improvisation through scat singing. At Primary 6, students engage in authentic learning, collaboratively composing original songs and working with a music engineer to produce their creations. This vibrant programme fosters a lifelong love for music, cultivates confident and culturally rooted individuals and prepares students for a globalised future.



## CLASSROOM EXPERIENCES (PHYSICAL EDUCATION)



At HGS, our Physical Education programme focuses on character building and social bonding through sports. We aim to nurture every student to be a physically educated leader who embodies values such as perseverance, teamwork and a growth mindset.

This year, our students participated in a range of exciting activities, including the NAPFA test, P5 School Camp, Inter-Class Skipping Challenges Games and Relay Races, where they developed their athletic abilities and school spirit. Through our Learn-to-Play sessions, students were introduced to a variety of sports—Wushu (Primary 1), bowling (Primary 2), golf (Primary 3 and 6), goalball (Primary 4), and archery (Primary 5).

These experiences continue to shape our students into confident, active learners who thrive in both sports and life.









### PRIMARY 5 (P5) ADVENTURE CAMP



For the very first time, our P5 Adventure Camp took place in HGS and left everyone with a truly memorable experience.

Our camp kicked off with exhilarating off-campus activities that set the tone for adventure. Students tested their skills at i12 Katong's indoor rock climbing, reaching new heights and conquering fears! They also journeyed to Sentosa for a thrilling navigation and rafting challenge, where they developed teamwork, strategic thinking, and navigation skills. Back on campus, students learned essential outdoor skills, like tent pitching and outdoor cooking, taking on tasks that required cooperation, patience, and problem-solving skills. These activities fostered a strong sense of independence and helped students build practical skills.

The energy of the camp culminated in the campfire where our P5 cohort gathered and exhibited their creativity and enthusiasm with dance routines and campfire cheers that brought everyone together.

Many wonderful memories were made and friendships strengthened. We look forward to more incredible adventures!

This year, students responded to the books read in class through different tasks like composing poems, song writing, dramatising, and letter writing to boost their oracy and critical thinking skills. A special highlight was teachers dressing up as literary characters and holding interactive sessions during recess, discussing their roles and stories. As part of the finale, students created a character passport containing positive and valuable messages they gleaned from their chosen character and book, and shared them with their peers. Through these immersive experiences, students have a deeper appreciation for the English language, and work towards becoming confident, creative, empathetic and effective communicators across diverse settings.





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# PRIMARY 5 NATIONAL EDUCATION (NE) SHOW



Since 1997, as part of the NE programme, all P5 students are given a special preview of the National Day Parade (NDP). It was a day filled with magic and memories, a beautiful reminder of the joy and uniqueness each child brings to our community.



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
#### TEACHER-LED WORKSHOP: PLAYFUL WAYS TO LEARN MUSIC
